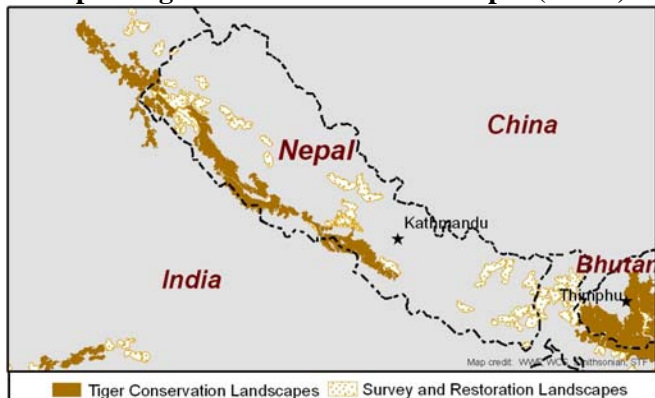


GLOBAL TIGER INITIATIVE COUNTRY SNAPSHOT – NEPAL

1. Improvement in wildlife legislation
2. Improvement in wildlife crime control
3. Strengthening community-based management
4. Amelioration of human-wildlife conflicts
5. Establishment of forest connectivity
6. Livestock management
7. Developing framework for tiger monitoring
8. Improvement in Protected Area management, infrastructure and equipment
9. Habitat restoration for tigers and prey
10. Trans-boundary cooperation with India
11. Public awareness on tiger trade bans

Opportunities for Early Action

1. Restoration of forest corridors through community forestry
2. Strengthening Protected Area management capacity, infrastructure and equipment
3. Building capacities for detection of trafficking and trade
4. Developing ecotourism projects around Protected Areas

* TCLs are large blocks of habitat where tigers are known to occur. Survey & Restoration Landscapes are large areas of suitable habitat where tiger status is either unknown to this study or where tigers have become recently extirpated. (WWF, WCS, Smithsonian, STF, 2007).
